

#### by Mary Cadogan

The themes listed in this index clearly indicate both the width and depth of Eric's articles. #### Foreword by Eric Fayne

I find it heart-warming that some readers still remember with pleasure some of the articles which I churned out from my typewriter in years gone by. Certain articles, in fact, go back to the time when our splendid hobby was young and when today's outstanding, thriving Collectors' Digest was in its infancy.

The object of the Let's Be Controversial series was that, hopefully, many would find the articles entertaining, but beyond that, plenty of readers would be tempted to reply and give their own opinions on the various themes. In fact, most of the items finished with a statement, and much more important, an invitation: "It's just my point of view-what's yours?"

And it was successful. Down the long years, letters poured in; most were very friendly as readers sent in their own views. Now and again there was a tart reply - and the tart replies added to the joy of the whole thing and opened the way for further discussion.

Each month, immediately after the current article, we presented extracts from letters on the previous month's subject, under the heading Controversial Echoes.

Of course, it says much for the splendid stories of Charles Hamilton, under his various pen-names, that we found such a great number of themes to discuss, doesn't it?

He created characters upon which the boys of the Gem, Magnet and Popular years like to model themselves. He wrote for youngsters, but the quality of his writing is proved by the fact that adults could read them, enjoy them and discuss them in later years. He never "wrote down" to his young readers and his writing was always grammatically perfect which is more than can be said for some writers who give birth to present day "best sellers" for adults. (It's just my point of view - what's yours?)

I may sound smug, but I'm sure that Roger Jenkins and I - Roger with his superb series of Do You Remember? and little me with my Let's Be Controversial series - covered every possible aspect of the work of Hamilton - the world's very greatest writer for youth.

Nothing has replaced those wonderful stories which made our own youth joyous and still add wonderful memories as we slowly become ancient.

Look at the world around you today and compare it with our Greyfriars, St Jim's, Rio Kid days (and don't forget Rookwood.) Give me the good old days every time.

June 1982 (#426): The Parkinson story written by Charles Hamilton in the 1926 Holiday Annual.

August 1982 (#428): The final series of the Cedar Creek tales. Frank Richards fleeing from father's ranch, and encounters adventures.

October 1982 (#430): Was Rookwood easier to write about by the substitute authors?

November 1982 (#431): The Gem's first substitute story 'The Schoolboy Jockey' of 1908 (and general comment on subs).

March 1983 (#435): The way the artists filled in details, perhaps contrary to the author's conception.
