

FRANK RICHARDS and GERALD CAMPION

The celebrated creator of Greyfriars School and the Billy & Bessie Bunter, Harry Wharton, Bob Cherry and Huree Jamset Ram Singh characters, Frank Richards, was the pen name of Charles Hamilton, born on 8th August 1876.

Charles lived at Kingsgate and the Bunter books appeared each year until his death in 1961.

EXHIBITIONS

The **Kent Costume Trust** will show a superb collection of **wedding dresses** from the 20s and 30s in celebration of the wedding of **Douglas Fairbanks** and **Mary Pickford**. These will be housed in the Council Chamber at Pierremont Hall, which will be open from 10.00 am to 4.00 pm daily (except Sunday).

Lights, Camera, Action is a glimpse into media history of the fabulous early movie era, and is running in conjunction with the Movie Centre – a newly opened museum in Ramsgate.

The **Broadstairs Exhibition** will be in the Festival Centre in Harbour Street.

The Frank Richards Collection of artefacts and memorabilia, on view at Port Regis on Wednesday 27th October only, with some items on display at the Festival Centre throughout the week, kindly loaned by Mr R. F. Acraman.

The Waterloo Museum in Crow Hill offers a wealth of history of the Napoleonic times, together with fascinating toy soldiers and memorabilia.



Thank you for your fax regarding our FRANK RICHARDS DAYS during the 1999 Celebrity Connections festival.

I am sorry that you are unable to attend the festival this year, I enclose a programme, although it gives only the bare bones of the events we are planning I am afraid.

The Frank Richards Collection will be on show at *Port Regis* (thought to be the original *Greyfriars*) and contains memorabilia donated to the town by Mr Bob Acraman, Chairman and Secretary of The Greyfriars Club. These items include:

A writing desk, typing desk, typewriter, stool, bookcase, cine camera, case and projector, Greyfriars plaque, photographs, many volumes of books, self-taught language books, printing plates, Opera music and words, novels, old newspaper copies, pages of sketches and artwork, postcards, chess and board games, and a small wooden box.

Mr John Wernham of the Charles Hamilton Museum in Kent may bring some items with him, but we do not know exactly what as yet.

I hope you find the enclosed programme of interest, and that when we feature Frank Richards again that you will be able to plan a visit. (I have taken the liberty of adding your name to our FR mailing list for the future) and have you visited our website yet at:
